Although we have board members and although we are a majority shareholder in the football club, it's important to remind people that we are not the football club.

We are completely different. Over time - and through nobody's fault - its just the way it has happened, we have almost merged into one big community football club, rather than being Pompey and the PST.

We are viewed as one wider group instead of being two seperate and distinct organisations.

That's something that definitely needs to be addressed moving forward.

Talking of going forward, now seems as good a time as any to announce that there is going to be a big launch at the Lanyard Pub on Monday, February 16 for our York2Pompey ride.

It's on the same lines as the fantastic Ride2Bury trip we did last year, except from that we are coming back to Fratton Park for the last home game of the season (against the Minstermen) rather than being away at Bury.

It is time for Blues fans to do what we do best-support the club




